On Getting Well: Helping or Enabling?

You want your loved ones to stop drinking so much. You want them to get well, and you're willing to do anything to help them. But so often your efforts fail or make things worse. There is a right way to help, health professionals say, and a wrong way.

K is a member of Al-Anon, an anonymous 12-step program for family and friends of alcoholics. She used to do a lot for her alcoholic former husband. "He needed me and he asked me for help," she says. She picked up after him. Drove him to bars and stayed sober to drive him home. Smoothed over others' feelings when he was hung over and irritated, or drunk and angry. "I would be the mediator when others got their feelings hurt. I'd explain things to everyone." K did it because she believed it helped her husband. And marriage, and family. She said she felt strong and capable.

But after ten years, K burned out. "It was exhausting to do his work and have the energy for mine," she says. She realized she'd stopped living her own life. "I was constantly on high alert, in case he might need me. Then I couldn't tell the difference between his whims and real catastrophes."

When the police got involved, K realized that giving up her life had not brought about sobriety. "It was all for nothing. Futile," she says. She had lost her emotional compass. "I was desperate and thought I was crazy."

When a friend said she needed Al-Anon, K didn't understand how that would help. She wasn't drinking; she didn't have the problem. But she read their book of daily meditations and liked it. So she went to a meeting. They might help her keep her husband from drinking. Instead, they offered K a way of life that gave her

serenity, and even happiness, whether her husband was drinking or not.

Today K understands that she'd been treating the alcoholic like a child. "I was denying him the right to choose," she says. "To choose to grow up and mature. To choose sobriety."

Addiction and recovery professionals use the term enabling to describe well-intentioned efforts to help alcoholics and addicts that are ultimately ineffective. In recovery, people say it's: Doing the same thing and expecting different results.

There is a way out.

M's father had drunk all throughout her growing up. At one time he was high-functioning, but eventually the drinking got to the point in which he no longer left the house except to buy more alcohol. M did too much for her Dad and hit bottom when her almost-superhuman efforts could not make her Dad sober. She went to Al-Anon and learned to detach with love. "When I stopped doing the things he could, and should, do for himself, I gave him the dignity to accept the consequences of his choices," she says. That process taught M to make choices that were good for her, even if her Dad was still drinking.

And she stopped being the hero-child for her family. "I stopped smoothing things over between family members. I let them figure out how to communicate with each other. When I stopped acting as the family 'translator,' everyone began to develop their own relationships with one other. For years I had been preventing my family from developing real bonds with each other." Half her family went to Al-Anon, too.

Eventually, Dad got sober in AA and the entire family was elated. Because of Al-Anon, they knew to let him work his program without their interference. Today, years later, an-

other family member has developed a problem with alcohol. Half the family takes it one day at a time, as they learned in Al-Anon. The other half engages in daily "drama," M says.

When the alcoholic member was to be alone for a week, M went to stay with him. Her role was clear. "I was not there to fix or rescue him. I was only there so he knew he was not alone. I'm not the hero-child anymore, and I have no desire to be that again."

M says the time together was draining, but also the right thing to do. One night, as she navigated through Netflix, suggestions appeared based on his past selections, and she was shocked. "They were dark and depressing and ugly." She found a baking show and told the once-aspiring chef, "I'm going to watch this, and you should join me. I think you'll like it." It was a little bit manipulative, because I knew he loved baking, but it was mostly self-care," she says proudly. He did watch. And they baked a cake together. He decorated it with a fresh grape on top—it was all they had in the house. Then they sat down to enjoy it.

Helping people who are addicted to alcohol or drugs by doing things for them that they could otherwise do themselves, and would be better off

doing, is called enabling. It gives the addicted brain permission to continue using.

As long as M rescued her dad at home and in his business, there was little incentive for him to stop. She was not going to go through that again. K says her ex-husband refused to stop drinking despite DUI's, AA, and advice from medical specialists. She couldn't change him; only herself. And she left. He's still drinking, she says, while she's happily remarried.

Sometimes only by allowing our loved ones to experience the full consequences of their addiction do we actually help them find (or rediscover) recovery.

Only the addict can make — and stick — with the choice to live in recovery.

Professionals say forms of enabling are:

- Covering up for an alcoholic
- Lying about their using or drinking
- Giving them money
- Getting them a job
- Managing their schedule
- Managing contacts with other people who use
- Setting boundaries you don't enforce
- Vowing consequences you don't follow through on
- Bailing them out of jail

It might seem cruel to separate a family from the mother or husband or nephew by refusing to help them, i.e., giving them money or bailing them out of jail. But sometimes that refusal is the very thing that motivates them to accept treatment, whatever form that treatment takes.

The most loving response to a person's substance use is self-care, recovery professionals say.

Al-Anon literature states that "our thinking becomes distorted by trying to force solutions" to the person's drinking or using, and that "we become irritable and unreasonable without knowing it." This starts to straighten out only by understanding that you did not cause the addiction, you cannot control it, and that you cannot cure it.

It's only by taking care of yourself that, when an addict reaches out, can you be sufficiently fit to truly help them—physically, financially, emotionally and spiritually.

Al-Anon meets Mondays at the Nazarene Church (2nd floor) from 6-7 p.m.. For more information, call 907-304-1480. Al Anon is a 12-step group adapted from AA to help the families and friends of alcoholics recover from the effects of another's alcoholism.
